

The route is only about 6 miles.

The tunnels are supposed to be open five times a year for vehicles 1948 and older so this is a seldom available photo opportunity for you and your old car. The car show in Mosier is for vehicles 1962 and older. This area is not very far from Skamania, Washington and the Sunday, September 1st car show at Sharon Tiffany's Columbia Gorge Interpretive Center. So spend the night in the beautiful Columbia River Gorge area and do both events!

Richard showed me his '37 Dodge pickup, which had been in the family since it was new and a '49 Dodge Roadster which is a work in progress.









2003 East West Tour Update, by Tom Nachand

I've contacted Ed Peterson. National Chairman for the East-West Tour. He's still in the same predicament he was in early spring. They still haven't figured out the mid-west area of the tour so are not sure when the tour will arrive in Yellowstone Park, whether they intend to drive through or spend the night. I'm assuming since it would be a major attraction we'll probably spend the night. In looking over the options available to us I fa-vor the route of leaving Yellowstone going north through Butte, Montana and over-nighting in Missoula, Montana. The next day would be a long drive but would cross the Lolo Pass and drive down through Central Idaho (Orofino & Lewiston) over-nighting in Walla Walla. The next day cross-

ing into Oregon and at Umatilla crossing back into Washington and follow Hwy 14 down to Bridge of the Gods, stopping at such sights as Stonehenge, Multnomah Falls and then overnighting around Troutdale. The last day has plenty of options with a route to Tillamook, another through Lincoln City, or yet another on Hwy 99 to Corvallis then to Hwy 20 to Newport. I strongly feel that the central route through Idaho would add much to splendor rather than the desert and heat of a southern route through Idaho and Eastern Oregon. There has been some concern of the Central Idaho route being congested due to the Lewis & Clark Trail Celebration. If there is anything, I don't think we'll be bogged down by it as our average speed

is supposed to be around 35 mph. Any celebration would just add to the ambience of the trip. The idea of over-nighting around Portland is to involved all members of the club to join in on the final leg. I would hope that everyone will become in-volved by that time, We will need help contacting

Chambers of Commerce of the over-nighting cities to gather accommodations for the traveling party. Restaurants. Support companies (towing, etc.) even mapping out the rest areas along the way, Nothing is hap-pening at the moment, but when the National Club steps up with the information for arriving in Yellowstone we will then be up again. Any volunteers???


