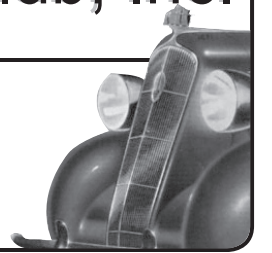

Ken VanCoelen's 1951 Plymouth Belvedere Cranbrook

This month's Plymouth club member car feature is a 1951 Plymouth Belvedere Cranbrook, owned by Ken VanCoelen of Milwaukie, OR.

The '51 was purchased by Ken's father in August of 1958 in Tigard, Oregon. After three years as the family car, the '51 was garaged in lieu of a new car.

In 1962 Ken became old enough to tinker with cars and it eventually became his. Ken drove the '51 through high school. He attended both Wilson High School for his academic classes and Benson High School for his shop classes.

Shortly after high school Ken enlisted in the Coast Guard and the '51 went into the garage again. After his military service Ken purchased a 1968 Roadrunner, so the '51 did not get out of the garage except for an occasional trip around the block. Ken still has the Roadrunner, with only 13,000 original miles.

In 1987 Ken tried his hand at reviving the '51. He transplanted the V-8 318, running gear out of a 1978 Volare, as well as the front clip. The project fell short of Ken's expectations and without the money to really redo the '51 the way he wanted, he lost enthusiasm, so it was back to the garage again.

For the next few years it was family and work, Ken has been a truck mechanic for PGE over the years, spending many hours working overtime so he would be setup for retirement. After the Enron fias-

co, Ken was not able to realize his dreams of early retirement, so he has continued to work.

Ken says he has owned many cars over the years including, Chargers and Barracudas. He wishes he had a place to store them, they would be great to have for car projects.

A couple of years ago Ken was introduced to Bob Falleur, a car restorer. He has restored cars that have been in Road-

Ken confesses to be very picky and that he needed to have someone like Bob and his contacts to help him to realize his dreams for his '51.

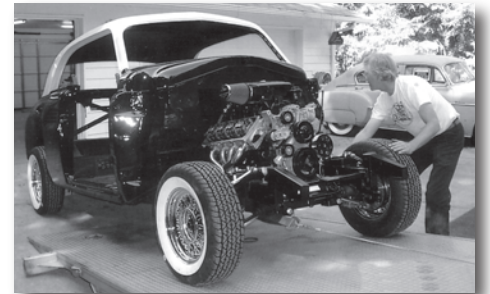
Fortunately for Ken he saved himself a lot of expense by having his '51 stored in a garage. With no rust to speak of he was able to dive right into his dream project.

Ken decided that he wanted his '51 to look like an original '51 and resemble the early Chryslers of the early 50's in all their glory, down to the chrome wire wheels. But on the inside he wanted updated comforts of better suspension and drivetrain advances.

Here is a recap of Ken's '51 make over. The suspension is a Fat Man front clip, Mustang II suspension, rack and pinion with disk brakes, 9" Ford rear end chrome wire wheels and with white walls.

The power to move the '51 down the highway is a 2004 Dodge 5.7 liter V-8 with the Dodge automatic transmission. A new wiring harness from a vendor in Arkansas, will allow Ken to use the computer from the '04 Dodge to give him the most current technology available. Bob had to do a little fabrication to fit the big V-8 but it will surely make the '51 move down the road with ease.

The paint scheme is a light mint green top and a 1995 Jaguar non metallic dark green, that Ken saw

at a British European Import show last summer. It will look kind of like a convertible from a distance. A friend of his, Jack, who lives in Canby did the painting of the '51.

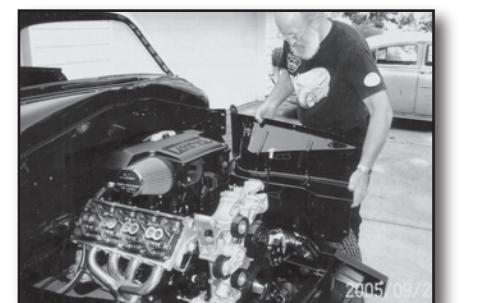
The interior of the '51 has also seen a few changes. With the installation of a new tilt-column shift steering column, Vintage-Air to keep everyone cool, restored instrument gauges, a tricked out stereo system, and electric windows everyone will be wanting to get a ride in Ken's '51.

Ken has not been on the sidelines through this process. He has been at Don's side to make the decisions and do what he can so that he will know everything that has gone into the '51.

They say careful what you wish for, in this case I think after talking with Ken about his '51 he is getting everything he could have ever wished for. He can't wait to get the '51 out on the road again, look for it at an upcoming meeting or club event.

Ken says he is looking for a '51 convertible to keep his hardtop company.

March Technical Tips:

Engine Misses on Acceleration

Possible Causes:

1. Distributor contact points dirty or improperly gapped.
2. Spark plugs dirty or the gap set is too wide.
3. Dirt in the carburetor.
4. Acceleration pump in the carburetor not operating properly.
5. Coil or condenser defective.
6. Incorrect ignition timing'
7. Burned, warped, or pitted valves and or valve seats.

Engine Misses at High Speed

Possible causes:

1. Distributor contact points dirty or incorrectly gapped.
 2. Spark plugs dirty or gap is set too wide.
 3. Dirt or water in the fuel line or carburetor.
 4. Burned or cracked distributor cap.
 5. Defective coil or condenser.
 6. Dirty jets in the carburetor.
 7. Incorrect ignition timing.
 8. Excessive play in distributor shaft.
 9. Distributor shaft cam worn.
 10. Carburetor pump lever setting set wrong, check for Hot Climate, Cold Climate, or Summer driving.

March, Safety First:

Safety Tip:

I know I sent this recently, but it is time to resend it as we are coming into the spring time of the year when we are about to check those cars to make sure they are ready for those planned tours.

ANTIFREEZE

It is time to change that Antifreeze, or to drain that radiator for some reason, like changing out a Water Hose, or Thermostat, Freeze Plug on an Engine. What ever the reason for draining that Antifreeze, there are some Safety Precautions to take. DO NOT SPILL IT ON THE FLOOR.

1. What is this stuff called Antifreeze have to do with the car? (Antifreeze does exactly what it says it will do, "ANTI" freeze, keeps the coolant from freezing in the Cold Weather days).
2. What is so Dangerous about Antifreeze? (Antifreeze has a sweet taste to it, DO NOT TRY TASTING IT JUST TO FIND OUT IF IT IS SWEET OR NOT! TAKE MY WORD FOR IT! Here is what will happen if you did not get Medical Attention Immediately after drinking or just tasting Antifreeze, The Undertaker will pay you a visit for the first and last time. It will enter into your liver, then the damage is done, and without your liver you will DIE).
3. KEEP ANTIFREEZE AWAY FROM YOUR CHILDREN AND PETS.

There just is not enough time left to get Medical attention to save them. If you do spill Antifreeze, wash it down with soap and water, then rinse it completely.

On March 8th a group of 16 met at Bob's Red Mill in Milwaukie for the Mayflower March tour.

A long table had been reserved for the group and a short history of the business ensued along with a video. Each person received a bag of Bob's Red Mill Scottish oatmeal.

Bob's Red Mill has been in business for 28 years, beginning in northern California. Bob Moore and his wife Charlee "retired" and moved to the Portland area to attend seminary.

Bob stumbled on to an old vacant mill near Oregon City and the two came out of retirement and created a thriving business that now distributes their product internationally.

The original mill was destroyed by fire in 1988 but the grinding stones were saved and Bob's Red Mill was resurrected in Milwaukie.

In 2003 their new building that looks like a huge big red barn structure opened with a deli, bakery, retail store and teaching kitchen. Judging by the number of people that were in there prior to the lunch rush it appears to be a very successful operation.

Bob's opens early and is a popular breakfast spot serving natural whole grain foods. After the tour the group ordered lunch and browsed the retail store.

Next stop was the Mill End Store a fabric wonderland. Finally, those that wanted to met at the Goodwill Distribution center near Sellwood. This is an interesting experience.

Large bins on wheels are wheeled into the main store and shoppers gather around the bins and riffle through the merchandise. It is primarily clothing and it is sold by the pound.

Technical Meeting March 4th, 2006
I want to thank all the Members who showed up at the Technical Meeting to kick some tires and make repairs to Hank Baker's 1954 Plymouth Belvedere Station Wagon.

The committee immediately went to work inspecting the possible items which may need attention to do a tune-up to make Hank's car start and run better.

What the committee found, was a low battery to start with, a battery charger was connected to the battery.

While that was being taken care of, some of the Members found that the spark plugs were getting too much gas/air ratio. A new set of spark plugs were ordered up, with a set of points and a new condenser.

The rotor was good enough to just a little cleaning, and the rotor cap was in excellent condition.

Ray Dunn and Loren Bennett pulled the distributor out, and performed the operation on it with the new points and condenser.

Vacuum lines were checked for any leaks. The dwell checked out fine.

The timing was checked and readjusted to specks. The Carburetor received a NEW paper cardboard gasket cut from a cardboard box, this helped to shield bypass air coming into the carburetor between the Air Breather and the Carburetor.

When it came time to start the car, everything worked like clockwork, that car ran great.

We called Hank to come over to give it his Special touc for starting, he said he was a happy camper, and he wanted to thank all the Technical Committee people who showed up for this event.

Engine Color Controversy

Richard Tetzlaff from the Tall Pines Region who has a 36 Plymouth with a silver engine recently asked a question of the Cascade Pacific Plymouth Club Technical Advisors.

It seems there is some controversy about the engine block color in Plymouths prior to 1940.

The 35, 36 and 37 Technical Advisors for the Plymouth Owners Club have indicated that points would be deducted for silver engine blocks prior to 1940 yet the Club's chief judges guide issued in 1991 states that the engines are silver and not black.

A historian from Daimler says old photos show a black engine block with silver heads and also some with complete silver engine assemblies.

Weigh in on this controversy. If you have an original pre-1940 engine, let someone from the Tech committee know or send an article to the newsletter about its color or colors.

A couple of weeks ago I went to the Portland Roadster Show at the Portland Convention Center.

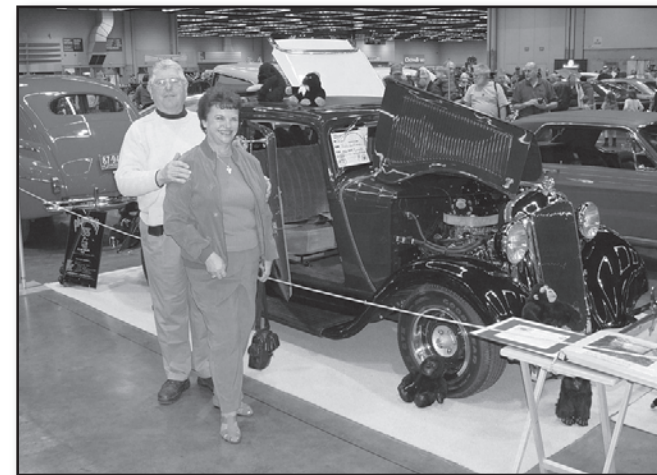
With over 600 cars to see there is something for everyone's taste.
