CPPC Makes Great Showing at the Northwest Car Collector Show

CPPC has tried to become a member of the Northwest Car Collector organization for the past several years. This year they were accepted and this year's car show and swap meet on October 15th and 16th became their first.

Jerry Klinger and Scott Farnsworth have been representing the Club at monthly meetings all year. As a member, clubs are required to provide duty responsibilities at the car show and swap meet and CPPC didn't have any trouble filling their spots almost imme-

Duties included checking entry at the various gates, working the duty office, walking the buildings to make sure vendors are complying with rules, coordinating car trailer parking and fire watch which requires showing up in the wee hours of the morning to make sure no fires break out.

CPPC had about a dozen members who volunteered to work these four hour shifts and as a result the Club will earn a portion of the proceeds from the show.

Jerry and Scott also served as the Club's representative and alternate representative which required some additional duty. Along with the required duty slots, clubs can also prepare a display for the car show which in the past has earned additional money.

Each year the event has a theme and this year's was "Santa's Back in Town". Needless to say Hall E of the Expo Center was a sea of Christmas trees, Santa Claus's and simulated snow.

There are 30 plus clubs in NWCC and the majority of them prepared a

To lend even further to the authenticity of the display Rich had had a fender bender with his car on the way to the September Club meeting resulting in an unsightly dent in the front of his car just above "Grandma's" final resting spot.Rich, you went above and beyond to make our display look real!

John Sweeney often introduces himself as "I'm John Sweeney from Hollywood" because he lives in the Hollywood district of NE Portland.

But now Hollywood has really come to John Sweeney as his '39 P-8 4-door fastback has been commissioned to appear in a Hallmark Hall of Fame movie being filmed in the Marion and Clackamas county areas of Oregon through November 11th.

Most of the filming will be in the Scott's Mills area. John got a call from some of his HACO buddies suggesting he take his car out to Woodburn where they were looking for some mid to late 30's cars for a film that takes place after WWII.

So he took his car, which he has owned for almost 50 years to downtown Woodburn on Monday, October 10th to see if it would make the cut.

They wanted cars that looked like a "working man's" car and John's fit the bill. John was asked if they could use the

car for the next 4 weeks and they would pay him \$2,500.

They would also provide insurance on the car and assured John the car would be returned in the same condition as they received it. Needless to say, John accepted on behalf of his green '39.

John said it was so fascinating to watch them transform downtown Woodburn, normally a Hispanic district into a small post WWII town complete with bus station.

The film is titled "The Valley of Light" based on the novel by the same name written by Terry Kay (To Dance with the White Dog). It's a two hour Hallmark Hall of Fame presentation that will air on CBS in the fall of 2006.

It is set in 1946 and tells the story of Noah Locke, a World War II veteran who returns home to find his parents have died, his younger brother is in prison and the family farm has been sold.

Noah becomes a local celebrity because of his gift for fishing. The film

is described as the story of relationships and emotional values, true to the Hallmark tradition of family films.

Since the film company has had John's car he has received several phone calls with special requests. The first request was to turn his whitewall tires around to match the other cars in the film that all had black walls.

This is the second movie that John's car has been in. About 12 years ago it was used in a film being made in the Hollywood district staring Dennis Quaid.

October Technical Tips

Engine Misses on Acceleration

Possible Causes:

- 1. Distributor contact points dirty or improperly gapped.
- 2. Spark plugs dirty or the gap set is too wide.
- 3. Dirt in the carburetor.
- 4. Acceleration pump in the carburetor not operating properly.
- 5. Coil or condenser defective.
- 6. Incorrect ignition timing'
- 7. Burned, warped, or pitted valves and or valve seats.

Engine Misses at High Speed Possible causes:

- 1. Distributor contact points dirty or incorrectly gapped.
- 2. Spark plugs dirty or gap is set too wide.
- 3. Dirt or water in the fuel line or carburetor.
- 4. Burned or cracked distributor cap.
- 5. Defective coil or condenser.
- 6. Dirty jets in the carburetor.
- 7. Incorrect ignition timing.
- 8. Excessive play in distributor shaft.
- 9. Distributor shaft cam worn. 10. Carburetor pump lever setting set wrong, check for Hot Climate, Cold Climate, or Summer driving.
