# Scenic By-Ways Lead to LeMay and Flight Museums, Comaraderie

A beautiful late summer drive along two-lane highways took the CPPC to points north on Saturday, September 13. The old roads frequently parallel I-5 but the views are more interesting.

Predictions of 90 degree temperatures

discouraged some people from driving their old Plymouths from Portland to Seattle. Four classics were in the initial caravan from Portland, though.

The lunch destination was Mary McCrank's Restaurant on Jackson Highway on the south end of Chehalis. Ms. McCrank lived in part of the rambling old house, and welcomed customers with fresh homecooked meals from 1935 until her death in 1984. The Schopp family continues the tradition in rooms that display the history of the restaurant, china collections and more than 120 teapots. A customized menu greeted the CPPC travelers and the food was delicious. Go to www.marymccranks. com to plan your own visit.

Continuing on Jackson Highway led us through downtown Chehalis, renovated with many antique shops and small businesses, then to Hwy 507 past rural towns with a rare view of Mt. Rainier on a gloriously clear day to our primary destination: the LeMay Museum

in Spanaway, WA.

Harold LeMay owned and operated a Tacoma trash collection company. He worked hard, invested well, and indulged his affection for collecting vehicles. Between the early 1960s and his death in 2000 LeMay accumulated 3,500 cars and trucks. The inventory is smaller now - only 2,400 vehicles. The docent told us that Mrs. LeMay refers to her home as "a house with

a 300 car garage."
Another 350 vehicles are displayed at the Spanaway museum grounds, the former Marymount Military Academy. LeMay purchased the property from the nuns who operated the former school with the promise that the original structures would remain intact.

The school auditorium is now LeMay Hall, with two-level rows of antique cars. The former swimming pool is filled with cars. car parts and boarded over to support rows of British motor cars. Another room

displays two tiers of autos including the Flint(stone)mobile and the promotional version of the 1958 Plymouth Fury, Christine.

The adjacent "Green Building" displays another couple hundred vehicles. Rows of beauties from almost every era and vintage delivery, fire and semi trucks are parked mere inches apart. The ultimate Lemay Museum will be built next to the Tacoma Dome within the next three years to display another 800 cars and trucks. More information can be found at www.lemaymuseum.

George and Ana Haley, CPPC members in Federal Way, WA led the group from Spanaway along the Tacoma waterfront and Dash Point scenic route to the Courtyard by Marriott in Federal Way. A total of 32 people attended the buffet dinner at Marie Callenders. Ana prepared door prizes and made customized placemats featuring Plymouth model years and photos. Later that night she went home and made specific pages for some members'

destination. We wandered the original such a success.

"Red Barn" building that housed William Boeing's first aeronautics company in 1910 and was moved to the museum site to house the early history of Boeing. A docent regaled the group with the history of the many types of air craft in the Grand Gallery. An adjacent exhibit details the history of NASA and biographies of the eight astronauts from the Pacific Northwest. President Gary especially appreciated the diorama section with WWII exhibits, taped narrations and audio to recreate air battles.

Our energy flagging, we boarded the last Concorde to cross the Atlantic and the Boeing 707 Air Force One that served Presidents Eisenhower and Kennedy. - 6. Worn main metering jet.
- 7. Sticking choke.

# Tech Team Steps In to Help Another Member; Ken Rose's 1935 Almost Ready for the Road

President Gary Rusher made a and differential and determined that the request at the last meeting for someone to help get Ken Rose's 1935 4D sedan in. Ken has been battling some health issues so Gary thought it would be nice if his car could make it for display.

Dave Williams and Ken VanCoelen volunteered to help. Ken had said that the car needed a new battery and new gas so Dave and Ken went to Ken's house one day to take on the task. Gary Rusher also stopped by to help out.

The first task was to check the battery, which was definitely dead. The guys jumped the battery with a good battery and put gas in the carburetor and started it up. It was noted that the generator wasn't charging. They checked the electrical system and noticed considerable noise from the water pump and the generator so they oiled and lubed the water pump and generator. They removed the regulator and checked the wiring and found that a fuse was making a bad connection on the regulator. They checked the fuse with an ohm meter and found out that the fuse was good so they cleaned all the connections on the fuse and regulator and reinstalled the fuse and the regulator onto the generator.

They restarted the car and the generator was somewhat noisy so the bushings will need to be replaced at some point but the generator was charging well. Next they filled the master cylinder with brake fluid and jacked the car up with the rear end in the air. They shifted the transmission through all gears and checked the clutch

brakes did stop.

Finally they checked all the lights running in time for this year's cruise- and found that the right headlight had a bad ground so they ran a new ground wire to the frame. They checked the turn signals, brake lights and tail lights and all worked. At some point the gas should be replaced but the engine was running well when they were done. Ken chose not to have the car at the Cruise In but was very appreciative of all the work the guys did to get it running.

# Pat Brost Warns of Soft Plug Failure and Complications

Don't let this happen to you. Don't ignore a leaking soft plug in your engine

I put off replacing one in my '33 Plymouth and it blew out on me on the way home from the August meeting. I didn't want to stop on I-205 so I drove until the next exit. The needle on the temperature gauge disappeared from sight but the engine was okay.

The problem was that the temperature needle didn't re-appear after the engine cooled down. The mechanical gauges have a "Bourdon" tube which over-pressurized and froze up. This required the replacement of the mechanism which is not available new. It also required a new capillary tube.

One hundred and fifty dollars later I was back in business.
