





### Tech Talk With The **RADIATOR BOILS OVER**

This condition is usually caused by insufficient water in the cooling system and is indicated by the temperature gauge or light on the instrument panel. Trouble can be cause by a leaking radiator; leaking water pump or hose connections; a defective core plug in the engine water jacket; a lose or broken belt driving the water pump and fan; or a freeze plug leaking on the side of the engine block.

The best procedure to start with is to turn off the engine and let it cool. While it is cooling, look for leaks in the system, but do not open the radiator cap. It is under hot steam and water pressure. One could get burned from the hot water spewing all over when a cap is opened while under pressure. After the engine cools down, take a rag and place over the radiator cap when loosening it, and do so slowly. After that, it should be safe to open the radiator cap. Tighten hose connections if necessary, then place a cloth over the radiator cap and removed cap. The cap must be removed slowly to avoid a burst of steam in high-pressure system. Start and idle the engine; while the engine is idling, pour water in the radiator at a very slow pace so as not to cause the cold water to crack the engine block. Continue this until the radiator is full within one inch of the top. This will leave room for expansion. It will gradually cool down to a normal operating temperature. If leaks have been noted in the

radiator core or core plugs, there

is on the market a special radiator

sealing compound which can be

used to stop the leak called "Stop

a complete cure, the belt should be changed with a new belt. In the case of the water pump seal, adding a water pump lubricant and rust inhibitor to the coolant in the radiator can lubricate it.

## How to Build a Brake Adjustment Tool

Here is what I did for a brake adjusting tool. If you have some old drums around, you can build a couple.



This is for the front wheel: I install it like the regular drum, no grease on the bearings, just dry. I can rotate the drum, watching and measuring the space between the shoe and the drum, centering the shoe with the Cam Adjustments to meet full mesh on the drum. Then one has full braking when applied.

of the engine can be caused by a dry or defective fan belt. To check, stop the engine and press together belts on both sides of the pulley. A harsh rasp or creaking noise will be made if the belt is dry. Laundry soap can be used as a lubricant on the belt in an emergency. Submitted by Jimmie Fox



The rear drum is likewise, after the adjustments are made. We will back off the regular brake adjustment so as to make it easier to install the regular drum. Then we install the regular drum for service, make the final adjustment, and it is road ready.

When installing the adjusters on the axles, one does not have to force the rear drum as if it is the final installation. Put enough force to center it on the axle. By Jimmie Fox
