There are only a few things left to do:


- Publicize like crazy! Spread the word through social media, personal emails, and word of mouth!



Buying and Restoring a Classic Car

Part 3 of a Series - Restorations -

Work Space, Tools, Jobbing out Work, Time Investment

<u>Work Space!</u> If you plan on doing any type of restoration, or even serious maintenance, a decent place to work is essential. For many people, this is a garage of some size. For the more fortunate, an actual shop may be the choice. In any case, the more space the better.

<u>Family Support and Commitment.</u> If you plan on using a garage, what is parked in there now? If it is one or

two family cars - pretty much expect to have at least one of them parked outside. Spouses, kids and other close relatives need to be on board with these projects.

<u>Creature Comforts.</u> I use my 2 car garage for lots of projects and purposes. Here in the Northwest, that means considering both cold and hot working conditions. I installed an overhead space heater years ago. I also installed a used window air conditioner which I had.

Tools. You will do nothing but

get frustrated unless you have good quality tools, and a variety to cover most situations. A tool chest to store them in is also essential. Although perhaps not a "tool" by definition - a solid workbench is necessary, and with good lighting over it. Your workbench should be outfitted with a sturdy vise. Tool basics will include a socket set with regular and deep sockets, combination wrenches, breaker bars, a good torque wrench plus screw drivers, adjustable wrenches and "vise grips".

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Tire shaving, truing helps solve vibration problems on Bade '30 coupe

I recently found a solution to my problem that has been going on for almost a couple of years with my radial tires.

I have a '30 Plymouth Coupe street rod and went from wide-whitewall tires you could buy anywhere to the new Coker bias-look radial tires. I assumed that the tires were going to make my car run smooth.

That didn't happen, and repeated checks of balance, air pressure, etc. said there was nothing wrong.

I went to get the car alignment checked and the technician noticed the tires were out of round and anything he did might not solve my problem.

Eventually, I called Coker tire, they had me get the tires Road Force Checked to see how far out of round

they were. They were out of tolerance, like I thought and Coker did take them back finally.

The replacement Cokers – long story short – were just as bad.

I had heard of shaving & truing tires, and I located a shop in North Portland's Kenton neighborhood, called A-N-T Tire 8131 N. Interstate Ave, Portland, Oregon. It turns out that they do a lot of this kind of tire repair. Their phone number is 503-236-2106, they are open Monday through Thursday.

The man at A-N-T Tire, said he just

assumes the tires need to be shaved or trued and he always performs this operation on his own tires. The cost was \$45.00 for the tire shaving/truing and rebalancing.

I did a test drive and the difference was dramatic, the vibration was almost all gone.

I'm going to give my rear tires the same treatment, and in the end I will have what I had wanted from the get go, smooth running tires for my beloved street rod as I drive streets and highways.



Hammers, punches, wire brushes and chisels should also be available.

Depending upon the extent of restoration, you may also need a "cherry picker" hoist to pull out an engine, a transmission jack, an engine stand and a hydraulic press. Most of these tools are available to CPPC members through the Technical Committee (or members may allow you to use theirs).

<u>Painting equipment</u> may or may not be necessary depending upon what you plan on doing.

<u>Cleaning and polishing parts</u> is another area where equipment may be needed. Parts cleaning (grease and dirt related) can be done using a metal tub and wire brushes.

Subcontracting work out. There are many tasks involved in a restoration which can be subcontracted out. The balance is between costs, budget, your skill sets and time.
