

I will admit that I have an insatiable desire to learn about all kinds of things – including automotive products, construction materials and home garage remedies. Many of you who read this are no doubt like me. Would you like to have answers that are truthful and verified about these types of things? Yes! But is the world full of "folklore", "myths" and Internet deceptions about everything – also Yes!

I search around YouTube a lot, and I found a channel that is chock full of good information. It is called "Project Farm". It is run by a fellow named Todd, and he now has over 963,000 subscribers which is huge. Todd tests and evaluates all kinds of materials, tools, adhesives, oils and fuels. Every one of his videos is based upon a subscriber asking him to perform tests on something. He approaches these tests in a very scientific way, using logical evaluations while designing and building all of his own test fixtures. He does NOT do endorsements – all of his income is from on line subscribers (donors on Patreon).


This time we got a behind-the-scenes tour of the shop area. World of Speed


Member Care: Lorraine Griffey updated members on those who are ill or injured.
