Highlights from August membership meeting

The virtual meeting was called to order by Club President Phil Lapin at 7:05 p.m.

22 members participated. New member Brian Pemberton was welcomed to the Club. Brian lives in the Eagle Creek area and has a 48 Plymouth which he just acquired and is working on the engine.

Minutes of the July meeting were approved as published in the newsletter. Phil reviewed the Club's financial statement. Expenditures have been constant for the past few months and Treasurer Dolores Call reports CPPC's financial condition remains sound.

Phil announced member's birthdays for September, a complete list is included in the newsletter.

Mike Bade is working on a Commemorative booklet for CPPC's 20th Anniversary.

No new items to report on member care.

Robin reported that he is getting lots of help from members with articles to fill the newsletter. This month there were over 700 hits on the website with hits coming from Russia, Germany and all over the United States. The item that got the most hits this month was Mike Bade's article on replacing the water distribution tube in the engine. Robin is making a page for each member's car(s) so send him photos and stories about your car.

Activities have been slow due to the pandemic, however there will be a cruise in on August 29th at the Clackamas County Fairgrounds. Mike Bade and Jim Wheat plan to attend. Study is underway to plan a "drive-in" to various retirement homes with lunch at a fast food place such as Sonic, more to follow.

Discussion continues on researching lap blankets with the Plymouth logo to sell as an income producer for the Club. A search is ongoing to find a supplier, determine the type of material, cost, etc.

Mike Bade presented a slide show of his recent trip to the Bonneville Salt Flats. His photography is outstanding and he gave an excellent presentation on the different types of vehicles and explained how the timing process works. Phil Lapin showed a video on the effect of ethanol fuel stabilizers work and do they really make a difference. The video showed examples of pieces of metal soaked in gasoline with and without ethanol and/or stabilizers. The overall result was little or no damage in either test case.

Car quiz: Question 1. Which car was the first front wheel drive car in the U.S. Site the 1930s? Answer: The Toronado (whose name has no meaning), was promoted by ads featuring g racing driver Bobby Unser, who talked about the car's good handling. It was the first U.S made front wheel drive car since the Cord 810/812 in 1937. Ouestion 2: What is a "camaro" in real life? Answer: The most widely accepted explanation for how the Camaro received its name is that the branding team, who wanted a word that began with "C" to continue Chevy's naming convention at the time, misread a word in a French-English dictionary that meant "friend, pal or comrade." A competitor found that the word closely resembled the Spanish world for a "small, shrimplike creature." Chevy countered by saying the word ACTUALLY meant "a small, vicious animal that eats Mustangs." Question 3: What car from the 60s takes its name from a small naval Ship? Answer: The corvette is a Chevrolet model named after the small, maneuverable light warship class. The car received its name in 1953 from Chevy PR assistant director Myron Scott.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:21 p.m.

"Asphalt Camping" when evacuation starts looking like a good idea

Living in Boring, OR, Jean and I made a decision last week to evade the fire risk and smoke – we took our travel trailer down to Clackamas Town Center. We were under a "Level 2" warning, but simply could not deal with the dense smoke.

The mall parking lots had been designated by the county as a site for RV (only) parking. I would guess there were about 200-250 RVs of various types staying there. I write this not so much to talk about camping in an RV, but to express my amazement and gratitude at how well the emergency services handled this crisis.

We were parked efficiently by both mall security and Sheriff's dept personnel upon arrival. This was at night. The entire area was carefully patrolled all night.

At daybreak, we saw rows of portapotties set up, a mobile shower trailer, and tables of clothing, toys and essentials – all for the taking. The Kiwanis were cooking hot dog and burrito meals – and would accept no donations.

The next day, a lady with a BBQ food truck came through, giving free meals to anyone who wanted them. We had a knock on our door by a very nice lady from Clackamas County Health Services – inquiring as to how we were doing.

The second morning, we heard trucks, and saw septic trucks from the two local services staging themselves. They knocked on our door, and asked if they could empty our holding tanks – once again at no charge. A large water truck was roaming the lots – filling up RV storage tanks as necessary. There were stations positioned around with water and other essentials.

ALL of this was done at no cost what-

soever to the evacuees, and everyone helping out had a smile on their face. I assume that Clackamas County contracted with the major service providers, who all said they were not allowed to take any money. We all complain about government and bureaucracy, but here was an example of how crucial and effective emergency services can be when done right. Thank You to all of them.


Warning Buzzers

Do you constantly have one eye on the temperature gauge of your car while driving? Of course not! I have had several bad engine problems over the years when gauges would have told me something was wrong – but I was watching the road. The same applies to turn signals in vintage vehicles – which often have poor or no lighting indicators when the signals are on. Down the road you go, with your signal incessantly flashing away! These kinds of problems can be real safety issues, yet are corrected very easily thanks to modern electrical and electronic devices.

The key element here is to add a small buzzer as a warning device."Piezo electronic buzzers" are something we have all heard - but perhaps not thought of for our antique cars. I purchased a package of 5 buzzers through Amazon for a total of \$8.99 - a whopping \$1.80 each. They are totally enclosed, and about the diameter of a quarter by about ½ inch high. The ones I purchased have leads on them, and they will work with from 3 to 24 volts DC. Changing the voltage merely alters the pitch and volume slightly - perfect for our cars! Double faced foam tape secured them under the bottom of the dash. Just be sure to keep the polarity of the wires correct.

Application one: turn signals! The flasher unit on my 6v pos ground vehicle is an "electronic one". It has a third terminal on it which was unused. It turns out that the terminal puts out voltage whenever either direction of turn signal is on. I simply hooked one lead of the buzzer to that terminal, and the other to ground. Now I have an audible warning that my turn signal is on. If you do not have a flasher unit like mine, simply use 2 buzzers, with one connected to the





wiring for each front turn signal light. The end result is the same. Do not connect to the rear turn lights, as these often interact with the brake lights.

Application two: engine temperature. I recently had a new freeze plug come loose – and my engine temp went up somewhere over 212F before I saw steam. Another member just had the same experience as me. An audible warning is an excellent insurance policy against this type of event. Using the same buzzer as described above, it is coupled to a temperature switch. I purchased two normally open thermal switches from Amazon for a total of \$6.29. The ones I chose are very small

(about ¾" long, with two leads attached. They can be ordered in a variety of temperature settings. 90 degrees C is perfect – it will close contacts and activate the buzzer at about 200 degrees F. It can easily be tucked under any small projection on the head or block, and then wired into one of the buzzer leads.

Here is what I ordered from Amazon (in lots of words!) Buzzer: "DIKAVS 5 pcs 3-24v Small Enclosed Piezo Electronic Buzzer Alarm". \$8.99 for 5. Thermal switch: "Uxcell KSD9700 Thermostat 90 degrees C Normally Open Temperature Switch. N.O. 5A metal Bimetal Temperature Controller" \$6.29 for 2
