

Cosmichrome Chroming Process Revisited

I have had a call from one the CPPC members looking into the Cosmichrome process for parts on his Classic Plymouth.

A couple years ago, I took the reproduction fender skirt medallions for my '35 Plymouth, to Finish Line Industries Inc., in Newberg; where they used a process called, Cosmichrome, to chrome the medallions. The process is basically, painting with chrome paint, for things that can't be chromed, through the regular chroming process.

The Cosmichrome process is fairly expensive, if you only have one thing at a time it is cost prohibitive. It is one price for a certain amount of things to be chromed. It does look a little yellowish, compared to regular chrome, but it is the best you might be able to get.

The Board of Directors of Cascade Pacific Plymouth Club met on Tuesday, January 11, 2022, at 11:30AM at Elmer's Restaurant in Clackamas, Oregon

Present were Jake Higginbotham, Jim Wheat, Mike Bade, Robin Will, and Jerry and Joanne Dixon. Robin Will took the minutes.

Mike Bade, chairman of the board, called the meeting to order at 11:46AM.

Minutes of the November 9, 2021 board meeting were approved as they appeared in the November-December newsletter.

Treasurer Dolores Call's financial statement was approved as submitted.

Mike commented that the financial statement include new income of \$867.00 from Internet sales. Mike Bade and Phil Hall have done the heavy lifting on Internet sales, and the 13-month total income from that source is \$8579.50. This is the reason CPPC has remained in good financial condition through two years of pandemic, without any fundraising events.

Mike shared a printed inventory, currently running to ten pages in MS Excel format, of what has been sold and what is still for sale on eBay and craigslist.

The first general membership meeting of the year will be on January 25. Jake Higginbotham will provide snacks, Jim Wheat will bring soft drinks. Phil Hall will be guest speaker, talking about restoring his 1954 Plymouth Belvedere.

As of January 11, 33 members had

paid dues for 2022. CPPC's dues are \$25 per calendar year. Checks may be mailed to PO Box 2988, Clackamas, OR 97015, or dues may be paid via the Pay-Pal link on the front page of Cascade-PacificPlymouth.org.

The board noted the memorial service for Jeanne Mowery, on January 15 at The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints in Boring, OR. A clubwide email blast will be sent out with the information.

Election of officers, filling out the refreshments roster, and updating standing committees will be carried out at the January 25 meeting.

Some activities brainstorming went on at the board meeting – probably suggesting enough activities to fill a year's calendar – and the results will be brought to the membership meeting. CPPC needs an activities director to keep track of things. There was discussion about sharing our activities with the Studebaker Drivers Club, WPC (Chrysler Club), and the American Motors Club, if we can find contact info for them, to increase numbers and fun at our events.

The Tech Committee met on January 4 to update planning for our 2022 Car Show. Pam Ealy has already mailed out the minutes. Some work is in process, having been abandoned when the 2020 show was cancelled, and will be easily updated.

The Tech Committee also reported a large donation of parts by CPPC member Don Ryan, detailed separately in this newsletter. Mike Bade reported a donation of four boxes of automotive

The meeting was adjourned at 12:46PM.






