Bill Marble's 1935 Plymouth PJ Business Coupe

The Story behind CPPC member Bill Marbles 1935 Plymouth Business Coupe goes like this. The '35 was bought in Gresham, Oregon by Nels Jacobsen who lived in the Hurlburt Community, of Corbett, Oregon. Mr. Jacobsen had a chicken farm. He was elderly and had a difficult time lifting bags of grain from the trunk over the spare tire.

In 1937 Mr. Jacobsen decided to buy a 1937 coupe, which worked out better for his farm needs. He sold the car to Frank LaLonde of Gresham, Oregon.

Frank LaLonde used the car to drive to the shipyards and back. By the summer of 1960 Mr. LaLonde became very ill and that is when Bill entered the picture.

At age 15 he went to a local tavern in Gresham and asked Mr. LaLonde if he was willing to sell the car. A cash deal was struck at \$90.00. For Bill, this was two weeks wages crawling up and down fields harvesting daffodils bulbs for 10 hours per day.

Bill drove the car on back roads in Corbett (with learner's permit) since he was only 15 at the time. His family was living in California at the time and they went back at the end of the summer so Bill could go back to school.

The car was placed in a borrowed garage for storage until Thanksgiving. At Thanksgiving, Bill and his mother rode the train from Calif. to Oregon to pick up the car and drove the car from Corbett, OR to Burlingame, CA.

Bill was not 16 yet so his mother came with him, the trip was mostly without incident, although they did go through 18 inches of snow on Mt. Hood and broke a radiator heater hose, which they wrapped with a red kerchief, which

held until they arrived in Bend. The trip took two days to get to his home in California.

Bill originally planned to get a 1935 Ford 4-door, but his father was not very pleased with the idea. His dad, being a mechanical engineer and a pretty good

auto mechanic, did not think much of the early Ford mechanical brakes.

He believed the 35 Plymouth was far superior, as it not only had hydraulic brakes, but a synchronized transmission,

and a pressurized engine oiling system, as well as some other mechanical advantages. He felt the 1935 Plymouth Coupe was a good first car for Bill.

There was one stipulation however, Bill was to rebuild the '35's engine and brakes prior to licensing it for the hi-way. Through considerable effort, at his own expense, and the use of the Christmas vacation the car was completed to his father's satisfaction prior to Bills 16th birthday.

Part of the deal was that Bill was required to pay insurance and upkeep on the car. This prevented him effectively from abusing the Plymouth.

The '35 was Bill's sole transportation through high school, Community College in San Francisco and through graduation from Oregon State University in 1968.

During his years at Oregon State, Bill was dating his first wife, who lived in San Francisco, 615 miles away. Most weekends, Bill drove from Corvallis on Friday afternoon arriving in San Francisco 10 hours later and then returning back in time for classes on Monday morning. During those years Bill put a lot of miles on the '35 and the engine Bill had rebuilt in high school held up pretty well.

By this time the '35 was just worn out and Bill parked the '35 on April 12, 1968, and the last it ran was in 1973. It was stored in four locations, including the barn. While it was stored in a barn it got infested with mice, which caused a lot of damage to the upholstery and top of the cab..

Over the years Bill worked building custom designed cabinets, and as an engineer for Hyster company of Portland for 11 years.

When Hyster left Portland Bill took a job building the motors for computer disk drives. Since 1993 Bill he



There were 55 at the first member meeting of 2006. The meeting was also a celebration of Bill Call's 80th birthday.

February Technical Tips: EXHAUST SYSTEMS

Excessive exhaust noise & vibration.

Possible causes:

1. Check for interference of exhaust pipe, muffler and tailpipe.
2. Check hangers for looseness or damage and position hangers to insure free movement of the system.
3. Check engine mounts for looseness, deterioration of rubber from oil or excessively hard rubber mounts.
4. Check muffler for internal baffles.
5. Loosen entire exhaust support system, road test to permit self alignment and then retighten all mounting brackets. Make sure the whole system is free from rubbing against any metal on the body, and that there is plenty of clearance for the axle to move up and down without touching the tail pipe. Do NOT loosen the manifold pipe from the engine, unless it is necessary.

Leaking Exhaust Gases

Possible Causes:

1. Mating faces of manifold to the cylinder head should be checked and held within .010 inch alignment.
2. Check muffler and connections for leakage.
3. Check tailpipe for restrictions.
4. Check leaks at pipe joints, and manifold connections.
5. Check for cracked manifold.
6. Remove manifold and install new gaskets if necessary, after carefully inspecting both cylinder head and manifold mating surfaces. Then tighten manifold nuts evenly by working from the center out to the ends of the manifold.
7. Check for bent or pinched exhaust or tail pipes. Such conditions will retard the flow of exhaust gases. Install new parts as required.
8. Tighten clamp at rear muffler connection

Safety Tip: Wiring Tips

Have you checked the wiring on your car? Have a look at the wiring harness to see if there are some frayed wires somewhere.

If the wiring looks like the insulation is well worn and subject to short out when another metal object may touch it, it is time to do something about that situation, such as replace worn old wire with some new stuff.

Otherwise, you are asking for a fire to take place, and if that was to happen, and you are out on a tour on some back road, and there is no fire extinguisher available, you are subject to walk home without your car.

An electrical fire is hard to put out unless you have the proper equipment. Protect yourself and your investment. Replace that worn out wiring with New Wiring, and be sure you are using the proper gauge wire when replacing it.

Don't forget to DISCONNECT that battery before working with electrical wiring. Make sure there is a fuse in line where it is called for.

If you have some wires hanging here or there, find out where they belong, then make the necessary repairs. If you have lights that do not work properly, check them out, in case there may be a hot wire hanging loose somewhere. Or, it just might be a burned out bulb.

Mayflowers latest Adventure, Of Hats and Chocolate

A group of 13 participated in the first Mayflower tour of the year and came away very entertained and educated about hats and chocolate!

The tour began at the Ladd-Reingold House in Portland's Ladd's addition, the home of one of Portland's newest museums – the Hat Museum.

The house, built in 1910 is an old Portland Craftsman-style and not only houses over 500 hats, but also displays collections of mermaids, artistamps, crowns, hamburgers, a Cadillac couch, 10 foot clothes pin, a rare Soundie machine, John Steinbeck's doorstop, The Woman Who Married Her House wedding cake, kitsch and the little roadster that went coast to coast.

There is a mermaid painted on the ceiling by the same artist who painted the Plymouth Club's mural for the NWCC show. Alyce Cornyn-Selby has owned the house for over 30 years and is quite a character. She gives a very entertaining tour of the house and hat museum that is divided into four different collections; vintage hats, men's hats, novelty hats and hundreds of retro "today" hats.

Have you ever seen a Thanksgiving table hat that sings "turkey in the straw"?

The evolution of the hat mimics the evolution of the car. Hats were tighter and close to the head in the 20's when most cars were open. Once cars became enclosed the hats became more elaborate because there wasn't the fear of them blowing off a head.

One of Alyce's claims to fame is her cross country trip across the United States from Pacific City, Oregon to Atlantic City, New Jersey and back to Pacific City in her completely open purple roaster in April 2002.

Alyce bought the car from Matthews Memory Lane in 1997 and painted it a

bright purple with fire truck red wheels. Alyce wrote a book about her experience titled "Hit the Road, Across America in a Topless Car".

To read the journal she wrote on her trip check out www.going-topless.info. Her entertaining writing style will have you laughing and wanting to see the sights she relates.

One of Alyce's sayings is "life is not measured by the breaths you take but by the moments that take your breath away". Alyce's journey has definitely been breathtaking.

After the tour of the Hat Museum the group took a break for lunch at Madison's restaurant before heading to Jaciva's bakery and candy shop for a tour conducted by shop owner Jack Elmer.

Jack and Iva Elmer (thus the name Jaciva) originally operated Heidi's Swiss Pastries in Boring from 1972-84. In 1986 they opened Jaciva's on 47th and Hawthorne.

This is a family oriented business and their employees are like family members and that was very evident while touring the bakery and candy making shop.

Jack Elmer is a full blooded Swiss who was born in the U.S. He went

back to Switzerland and

took instruction in the Swiss baking method.

The Mayflower group, donned in white hairnets drooled their way through the tour which included Jack's daughter showing how different flowers are created for cakes.

Many of the methods and recipes that make Jaciva's such

a popular spot are secret and Jack told the group he'd have to shoot them if he let them in on it!

One example was their butter cream frosting that the group got to sample. The secret is that it will never develop a crust but remains smooth and creamy on the cake.

In the candy making room the group got to see how Jaciva chocolates are molded and the steps in creating the final product.

Jack gave a very entertaining talk on some chocolate history. He said he's often asked what the best chocolate is. You would think his answer would be Jaciva's but no, his answer was that the best chocolate is the chocolate YOU like the best!

Finally the tour ended in the retail store with the group buying some of the tempting products. One of the more popular items was the chocolate tooth brush.

Who wouldn't want to brush their teeth with that? Might I suggest some chocolate dental floss?

has been self employed, making a nice living, using his engineering skills to make various specialty products which he sells all over the world.

Over the many years Bill had always planned to restore the '35 to its original glory. Finally, after 32 years of waiting, on January 8, 2005, on Bills 60th birthday the restoration of the '35 would begin.

With the help of Bill's son Steve and Greg Smith, a close friend the process began. Every piece was disassembled checked and rebuilt if needed; even disassembling the leaf springs, making stainless steel sleeves for the brake cylinders.

Bill seems to be able to do most everything for the restoration of the '35. In one short year; he, Steve and Greg have completed the chassis of the '35, with all new paint, rebuilt the axles and wheels, new tires and brake lines. Bill is even using as many of the original bolts, with the Dodge Brothers stamp on them that he can. The engine is mostly completed and ready to install.

The painting is also complete on all the body parts as you will see in the photos taken. Bill says the color he painted the '35 is the original color, a gun metal grey, with a coating of Rino-Liner on the inside of the body panels to reduce road

noise.

The seat has been restuffed and upholstered in the original mohair, but he still needs to get the door panels and headliners built. He says he may try to do that himself before he is done.

There doesn't seem to be any detail that Bill and his crew have overlooked. He is trying to decide how much sanding and wet sanding he is going to do on the two stage paint.

With all the work Bill has done on the '35 it surely will be a sight to see and maybe we will see it on future tours and club activities this fall, when Bill hopes to have it running.
