July, August Tour Destinations: Volcano Garden Art, Pomeroy House, Lucia Falls In SW Washington

On July 18 part of the Mayflower group left the Airport Home Depot to meet the rest of the Washington group at Volcano Garden Art near Ridgefield, WA.

The twelve of us saw some interesting concrete works, many of which actually look like they were made from trees. Walkway steps and raised garden supports are made from colored concrete. Benches look like slices of beautiful trees with supports that look like stumps, fountains resemble pieces of wood. The workmanship is magnificent.

The owner, Tom McCarthy, guided us through his pouring shed and display areas, explaining the process and showing us his products. Of course many of us bought pieces and others went back later to pick up their treasures. We then caravanned to Up-Town Vancouver to explore some antique and boutique shops before meeting at Vancouver Pizza for lunch. It was a nice day organized by Joanne Dixon.

On Friday, August 1 part of the group again met at the Airport Home Depot to caravan to the Pomeroy Farm-House near Yacolt, Washington, where Karen and Don Ryan joined us. We browsed the gift shop and then went upstairs to the tea room to partake of their delicious tea lunch. After lunch and more browsing in the gift shop we took a tour of the Pomeroy House, which has been restored and has exhibits from the 1920s to 1970s with items that were found in the attic.

The Pomeroy family moved to the Yacolt area in the early 1900s, buying the house and farm sight unseen. Before they arrived the house burned down. The family

lived in a borrowed tent during a snowy winter until they could build another house. In 1910 a valley fire burned the house and farm. Their third log house was built at the base of the hill. When the road came through a few years later they decided to move the house on logs to the present location nearer the road. There is a lot of history in the privately owned house with its working blacksmith shop, barnyard and gardens.



After touring the grounds the group went about a half mile up the road to Lucia Falls, one of approximately eight falls along the East Fork Lewis River, which was beautiful. Another great day, thanks to Pat and Patty Brost.

The next Mayflower event will be on Friday, September 19. Vicki Williams is arranging a tour to the Clear Creek Distillers in Northwest Portland and lunch at McTarnahan's Brewery. President Gary Soaks Up Experiences, Information at POC Grand National Meet

I arrived at Auburn Hills late Tuesday evening and only noticed that there were quite a few Plymouths in the parking lot, but was a little tired and just checked into the hotel and picked up my registration materials. I had spent the earlier part of the day at the USS RADFORD DD446 National Naval Museum in Newcomerstown, Ohio. I had served on the RADFORD when I was in the Navy in 1958-1960. She was the most decorated destroyer the Navy has ever had and was scrapped in Portland in 1969. Had a great time at the museum with Vane Scott and his daughter, Gayle. The Radford Association will have their annual gathering there at the museum next month.

But, on with the National. On Wednesday morning I met with some of those in the hospitality room and kind of got the rundown on how things were set up. The day was generally a free time with several suggested self-guided tours. I spent the day meeting with Bob Koricko, President of POC, Bobbi Berkermeir, V.P. of POC, and others of the host group generally talking about how to put together such a meet. That afternoon we had a tour to the Walter P. Chrysler Museum which is on the grounds of the Chrysler Plant. We were only about five miles away and many drove their classic cars. We lined up the cars three abreast around the front drive, and still didn't have enough room for them all. The museum features all kinds of cars, many of which were proto-types, or cars of special

significance in the history of the company.

Thursday was a long and informative day. Don Wood, a POC member, is a noted historian and put together a DVD presentation on the history of the automobile in the Detroit area. The tour laid out the family trees of Ford, General Motors and Chrysler. I'm not sure how many sites we passed, but there were too many to count. We had lunch in a plant that is being restored, where Henry Ford built cars from 1904 until 1909 before the advent of the production line. In this plant each car was built in place with the parts being brought to it. Henry Ford is probably most noted for his next plant, The Rouge Plant, where they built the Model "T" and started the production line.

Friday was even busier. We took a bus to the Henry Ford Museum and The Village. They told us on the bus we had to pick one or the other, as we would not have time for both. Being a hot and humid day I picked the Museum as I figured it would be air conditioned and I wouldn't have to walk so much. You know I am one of those guys that wander through a museum and generally see everything I want in a couple hours. Well, we got there at 10:00 a.m. and at about 12:30 p.m. I saw a couple with those electric carts and thought if I am going to keep going maybe I should rent one myself. There were only ten of the carts and they were all out running around the place. Well, the place is so big I kept going until 4:30 p.m. when the bus left. I didn't see all of it, and never saw another

car. If you EVER, EVER get to the Detroit area you need to see this museum. Henry Ford built the museum and Greenfield Village because "he wanted an institution to share ideas and ingenuity, an institution committed to telling the stories of people determined to change the world around them and nudge civilization in a different direction." **Editor's Note:** WPC Photos will appear in the September newsletter.

Saturday was Judging Day. If there was any one thing that I was disappointed in it would be the number of cars registered for the show. There were only 95. But of that number there were some fine cars. I was privileged to tag along with one of the teams judging the Class One cars and learned a lot about what to look for in original cars. Saturday evening was the banquet and the awards, and a good time was had by all.

The long distance award was obviously won by a 1935 4-door sedan from Sweden. A lovely couple had this car restored in Sweden, ferried it to England, toured there, shipped it to New York, drove it 1,000 miles to Auburn Hills, showed it, and then planned to tour the East Coast down into the Carolinas and have it shipped back to Sweden.
