At my age we bought cars like that with earnings from after-school jobs, or our grandparents gave them to us, and we figured out how to make them work with the cash we had left after we put gas in the tank and shopped for tires that would hold air.

That's a long introduction to some things Jake Higginbotham showed me recently – a couple of small books about fundamentals of service for those 6-volt, carbureted vehicles that I still more-or-less understand.


I intended to lift a couple of articles out of the books for this space,

all fairness were old when I first got my hands on them), and cars that tended to vaporlock, and lots of other tips I had forgotten.



Mike Bade photographs mystery car at Hershey



Quick -- what is it, and how many of them have you ever seen? Clue: the steering wheel is on the right-hand side, and the hubcaps say "Chrysler."

Old-car folks enjoy trivia and puzzles, and that's what we got with the car in Mike's picture. It's 1935 model, coachbuilt for the English market. The hubcaps say "Chrysler."

From the grille and hood ornamentation, it might be taken for a 1935 Plymouth PJ. But who would take a bread-and-butter Plymouth to England and put a custom-built body on it?

After he photographed the car, (and remember, Mike has a '35 PJ convertible at home in his garage) Mike approached the owner, Ralph Marano, with questions. Marano (who deals mostly in Packards and other 100-point concours rarities) said it was a PJ, imported as a Chrysler to England, and fitted with a Carlton body.

That makes a reasonable amount of sense, and you'd think the owner knew what he had, but three other Internet sources identify the car (same number plate) positively as a Chrysler C-6, although the grille looks more like a PJ.

When Chrysler got an idea how much the public disliked the brandnew Airflow in 1934, they dusted off this 10-year-old platform and called it "Airstream." The Airstream outsold the Airflow 5 to 1 in its first year, and about 476 chassis-cowl units were sold to custom builders.

This one was sold to the Carlton Carriage Co. in North London, Eng-

land. They build this car as a one-off. It would have been an enormous gas hog in England even at the time, with its 118" wheelbaase and its 241.5CU flathead six.

There is no explanation, at least online, for how this Chrysler or Plymouth or whatever ended up among Ralph Marano's Packards, but it's so rare and so beautiful one can see why a collector would like it.

It would be interesting to park the cars side by side. If this one is a C-6 Airstream, its wheelbase would be five inches longer, than a PJ's, and its engine would be 44 cubic inches larger.

And this is the only one.



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


