

CPPC's scholarship fund – the need goes on

In a letter dated September 13, 2021, Randy Ealy received a letter containing thank-you messages for scholarships that were awarded in the Auto Technology Department for spring term, 2021.

It was a surprise – we weren't aware there were still funds in our scholarship account at the Clackamas Community College Foundation.

It was also a useful reminder that community needs have gone on through the COVID-19 spin cycle, and those of us who can step up to help ought to do it.

Randy brought the matter to the September 14 board meeting, and with relatively little discussion the board voted to immediately add \$1,500 to our scholarship fund at Clackamas Community College.

It was a reasonable move for the board to make. CPPC is in remarkably good financial condition considering we haven't had a fundraising event in two years. EBay sales of our inventory of donated parts has made up the difference. Students will benefit, picking up their educational plans post-COV-ID, and of course the funds end up in the exchequer of Clackamas Commu-



nity College, which has also been hammered by COVID.

CPPC has given scholarship funds to Clackamas Community College since 2015. We were able to turn over substantial receipts from the Hot Dog-Ust Day car show, and also solicit donors who wrote checks directly to the tax-deductible scholarship fund.

That might be what got us invited to the dedication of the new body and paint facility at CCC a couple of years ago. We were the only car club at the event. Aside from a couple of students who recognized the club's name and thanked us for the scholarship assistance, the thing we noticed most was the number of employers who showed up at the event – local businesspeople eager to show their support, and waiting to hire graduates of the Auto Technology program.



Note from Phil: Be sure you can turn the buzzer off!

In September 2020, I wrote about installing a small temperature sensor against vintage engine blocks. This is to provide an audible warning via a small under dash buzzer when the engine overheats. The sensor setup works perfectly, as it went off this summer when the car idled too long in hot weather. What I did NOT realize initially was the wide difference between trigger temperature and reset temperature on the sensors. I had installed a sensor which triggered at about 195 degrees F (20 degrees over engine operating temperature). I found out that there is probably 25-30 degrees between that trip point and the reset – meaning as long as the engine was running and back down to operating temperature, the sensor would remain tripped. The buzzer kept on howling all the way home on a short trip – with my grandson reaching under the dash to mute the sound as we drove. Hilarious, but not convenient! These sensors are available in only select temperatures, with the next higher one at or above boiling on the coolant.

There are various solutions to this problem – some simple and some exotic. What I ended up doing was to in-

Please contact Randy Ealy at 503-864-8111 stall a 2 way toggle switch which had no center off position. The output from the sensor now goes to the center terminal on the switch, with one switch position going to the buzzer, and the other to a small indicator light on the dash. In this way, if the buzzer goes off, the switch will allow shutting it off and illuminating an indicator light. After the engine cools from sitting, the sensor will reset, and the switch can be thrown to put the buzzer back in the circuit. P.L.

Landvoigt: Cable size, clean contacts are key to 6V performance

I believe that six volt systems can work well and reliably. Most issues I have encountered do not involve toughto-find or expensive parts. I have had no problems finding shops to rebuild 6 volt generators and starters. Nor have I found much of a problem finding new voltage regulators. My experience has been two problem areas.

The first is to assure that the battery cables, both ground and 6 volt, are of adequate size. 12 volt system currents are half that of a 6 volt. Folks sometimes go to a parts store and are given a 12 volt cable. This is too small and will cause problems. The battery cables should be at least #1, and #0 (bigger) is better. Have a good battery shop swage the connectors on. Don't try the ends that bolt on.

The second big challenge is cleaning up all of the connections so that the full six volts makes it to the required destination, be that the headlights, starter, or whatever. With club members out here, we have folks pull out one of their headlights and leave it hanging on the wires, start the car and set it to a fast idle, and turn on the high beams. Then take a digital multimeter (you can get one at Harbor Freight for around \$10) and measure the voltage across the headlight's filament. Often I have found voltages of $3\frac{1}{2}$ to $4\frac{1}{2}$ volts. This will not light up a 6 volt lamp very bright. From there we do a point-to-point check of the six volts from the battery to the light and back to the battery ground. You need to clean up each of the connections until you get close to 6 volts at the light. This also goes for the starter and most anything else.

These systems can be made to work reliably and for not a lot of money.



The meeting adjourned at 1:20PM.



Seeking buyer for donated 25" Dodge truck engine


CPPC is looking for a buyer for this 25" engine for a 1-ton or larger Dodge truck. It was rebuilt many years ago but was never ran. (See photos below)




